REPORT: September 22nd, 2025

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council accepts the CAO's update report as information.

COUNCIL FOLLOW-UP:

- Highway 2A directional painting: ATEC identified that the painting contractor did the turning lanes in error. This is to be corrected ASAP. The painting has occurred and removed and is now redone satisfactorily.
- Drainage Presentation: Newton Dr. driveway drainage. Operations Manager and CAO Binnendyk reviewed the site. The following was noted:
 - Water starts ponding behind the new sidewalk approx. 6 to 8 ft. and migrates towards the house; making its way towards the sidewalks as identified from the pictures given to the Town. There is no information identified as to where the water is coming from within the parcel. By evaluating the source of where the water comes from then an evaluation as to the best practice can be considered. The catchment area within the driveway needs the water drained to alternative place; options may be to the street, onto the lawn area or draining to the rear of the parcel. Raising the height of the driveway can direct water to the preferred direction the homeowner wishes to have the drainage move to.
 - This water issue originates from within the property of the homeowner and should be the responsibility of the homeowner.
 - The Town is receptive to placing an asphalt patch behind the current walk to tie into their current driveway. (approx. 2 ft. in width) This will have no effect on the current drainage.
- Waskasoo Avenue North Lighting. We have inquired with Fortis about an updated quotation for lighting running from Highway #42 to the new Public Services Building.

UPDATES:

Projects:

School:

- We have been in discussions with the Facility Manager moving forward on the separation between the buildings at the Library.
- This week we hope to reconnect to tour the current sites and discuss possible options for the use.
- Our Operational team assisted at the playground site, when requested, at the new school on several occasions since last meeting.

- Have a meeting with the New Superintendent with Mayor Yargeau on Friday, Sept. 26

Offsite Levies: Our offsite levy report is in progress with Tagish Engineering; there has been some back and forth on some lands and infrastructure requirements within the long term plans.

2025 Civic Elections: Nomination Day Sept 22nd. Election Day October 20th.

At the time of this report there is currently six candidates who have submitted nomination papers running for Council and two for Mayor.

- The Information Night was a little disappointing with minimal attendance to obtaining information in running for municipal office.
- We spent some time in discussion with Municipal Affairs Advisory on the new nomination processes. The new Local Authorities Election Act was released Sept 1, 2025.

Development items:

- Melcor's playground site location and play structures have been reviewed and acknowledged by Stantec who is designing the play area. They are hopeful to start preparation work this fall.
- Working with Brandon's team in getting information together for Council regarding Memorial Hall.

Administration:

- We have asked ATCO to assist the town by looking at options to determine if there is a possible way to make something work on the right-of-way where issues are. If it is not possible then we would ask that they take over responsibility and provide acceptable maintenance on this area.
- We did a follow-up email to Novamen in regards to how things are progressing with water discharge.
- Had another zoom think tank workshop with the Canadian Association of Municipal Administrators (CAMA) on Friday.
- Attended a zoom meeting with the Bethany Group to discuss the logistics of doing a community analysis and get into the queue for a future senior's complex. They identified that a community analysis/consultation will need to occur to assist in building a case for a complex. We have received some information but have not had an opportunity to review it yet.
- The director from CAEP reached out to see if Penhold is still interested in participating in the regional economic development partnership group. I suggested sending a caption of what their focus is going forward.
- ATEC forwarded information about 2A overlay to occur prior to the end of September. There is a patch on Hwy #42 by the overpass to be done also.
- Staff have teamed up to create a resident survey on budget items before we launch into the 2026 deliberations. The survey will be sent to Council for feedback prior to being circulated in the community.
- Staff are getting ready for the orientation for the new council term.

August 11, 2025, Meeting:

- New School Zone information was included in the August Utility Bill Insert and will be included in the September issue of the Penhold Reporter. Social media campaign advising of the change will start the last week of August.
- Amendment to the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw was included in the August Utility Bill Insert and will be included in the September issue of the Penhold Reporter. Website changes have been made, and the info will also be shared on social media.

MONTHLY UPDATE:

FCSS Coordinator & FCSS Community Navigator

- Summer Play Days were a success, with 50 being the highest number of attendees on one of the days. We observed meaningful connections forming among attendees, highlighting the program's positive social impact. Thank you to the Penhold & District Museum Society for donating ice cream vouchers. There are many happy children that couldn't wait to visit the Ice Cream Shack!
- Our annual Discovery Night was on August 21. Although numbers are typically lower than at a regular community event, the quality of connections and access to resources and information is the main goal.
 - 90 attendees
 - Attendee Comments (from completed evaluations):
 - Favourite part of the night:
 - Meeting people/community members, interaction with people
 - Sense of community
 - Talking with the vendors
 - The draws and conversation
 - Discovering new things about Penhold
 - Informational & welcoming
 - Learn about different services
 - Seeing clubs, I haven't seen before, (Red Deer Fencing Club)
 - Free stuff! And great info on local services.

- Everyone was very friendly
- Getting to know what is available in our new town we moved to
- Community, unity
- Most attendees found out about Discovery Night via Facebook, Penhold Reporter, and through word of mouth.
- 2 New Resident Packages were given out
- There were 43 exhibitors in attendance. We have created an extensive invitation list over the years of local community groups, service agencies, recreational organizations/clubs, schools, and a few select businesses that provide essential services like dental, childcare and similar, and Town departments. Local is defined as Penhold, Innisfail, Red Deer County and Red Deer. We review and update this list yearly.
- We are brainstorming how to modify this event to increase attendance, while still prioritizing the quality of the evening and its main purposes.
- The fall session of both Craft Club and LEGO Club has officially launched and continues to be a popular free drop-in program for children in Grades 1–3. Running twice a month, these clubs give kids the chance to explore their creativity through hands-on crafts and imaginative LEGO building. Beyond the fun, the programs encourage problem-solving, teamwork, and confidence in a safe, welcoming space.
- 2025 Mid-Year Highlights are attached.

Penhold Youth Club:

- PYC averages for August 2025
 Grades 4-6: 8 youth
 Grades 7 & 8: 3 youth
 Grades 9-12: 2 youth
- The Pancake Breakfast Fundraiser at the Canada Day event was a success, raising a total of \$1,588!
- Summer camps went well. The feedback was positive. One parent shared the following: "First, I want to say thank you so much. By the sounds of what my son has said, you have put on an amazing camp! The crafts and stories he came home with every day are awesome—a lot more than what I had imagined, for sure. If we weren't on holidays next week, I would sign him up again!"
- This year, camp participants were from Innisfail, Red Deer County and Penhold.
- We welcomed 24 enthusiastic campers for a fun-filled four-day session in August. Once again, we partnered with YES Program Coordinator, Jeremy, who joined us from Tuesday through Thursday to provide valuable support throughout the week.
- Staff are working on getting ready for the new season for PYC which begins on Monday September 17th.

Communication & Events:

Community Events:

- Fall Festival 2025 summary:

- Rides were a crowd favourite at Fall Festival and the demographic worked for older kids to enjoy the rides on Friday night with more families and younger children on Saturday.
- Since there were not volunteers to monitor a smaller bounce house for children too small for rides, it had been removed from quote. The ride provider donated the smaller bounce house and staff to run it for Fall Festival.
- Over 550 tickets were sold for the 3 rides and 1 giant obstacle course bouncer
- Each school was given 10 ride passes to hand out to any family they felt could use the tickets
- Volunteer groups were given family 4 packs to give away as contests / draws
- Ride Passes were sold for \$15 or 4/\$50 in advance and were \$20/ticket on site
- Advance tickets were available at Discovery Night and Town Office until 4:30 Thursday Sept. 4. Many people took advantage of the early discount savings.
- The Calgary Stampede Stage added a wonderful new element to Fall Festival making live bands possible and providing a great spot for groups and entertainment on Saturday. The volunteers who brought the stage mentioned many times how much they enjoyed the event and the people they encountered in Penhold. When our PYC & Facilities teams cleaned up and mopped the stage after the Pie & Fruit Roll Up Eating contests, the stage staff said that it was the first time any group had mopped and cleaned the stage for them.

Friday Activities:

- Craft Beer Wine & Spirits Festival (tickets \$10 / person, 18+ only) almost 500 attendees, 14 vendors poured 4,392 samples, this is the most successful event we have had to date.
- Mayor Mike's Mini Marathon for a Cause, (proceeds to Penhold Bark Park Committee) had 21 registrations. With no shows and on-site registrations, there was a total of 18 paid participants and \$500 raised.
- Ma & Pa's Bakery Café Show & Shine moved along Waskasoo Ave and had 70 entries, (4 less than last year, with 3 other show & shine events happening in Central Alberta the same night). \$10 registration fee plus donations accepted for Innisfail Food Bank totalled \$633 along with 36 lbs of food.
- Live band (Slappy Pappy) Friday night was provided by ATB & Organic Oasis Spa & Salon for their 10th Anniversaries and was a great success.
- Local youth band "Crash Activity" opened for Slappy Pappy and were well enjoyed by everyone in attendance
- Rides were open 5:00-9:00 p.m.
- Fireworks at 9:00 were very enjoyable, the new middle school means people must move around a little to see the lower fireworks, but there are many great viewing areas available.
- Food Trucks were busy right up to 10:00 p.m. (last call in Craft Beer, Wine & Spirits event)

Saturday Activities:

- Pancake Breakfast was held at the Penhold Senior Drop-In Centre, no feedback from Community TIES yet.
- Parade had over 30 entries and many positive comments
- Cultural presentations from Red Deer Indigenous Dance Troupe and Jing Wo (Chinese Cultural Association) had great engagement with spectators
- The addition of Fruit Roll-Up eating to the Pie Eating Contest was a fun addition. The pies for the event were donated by local business, Cutie Pies.
- Inflatable carnival games were run by the Penhold & District Optimist Club and enjoyed by children and adults.
- Kids Korner was run by the Penhold Church of Hope from noon until 3:00 p.m. with 35 volunteers assisting at many stations of activities for children 10 and under
- Library activities inside were well attended and 163 people utilized the outdoor game supervised by the Library
- Fight the Night with Red Stags of Red Deer was enjoyed by those who participated
- Vendor Market was run by the Museum and had 20 vendors with a great variety of items for sale
- Misting station provided by the Fire Department was a great place to cool off from the warm weather
- Food Trucks + Ice Cream from the Museum were busy throughout the day, one even sold out of food by 4:00 p.m.

Community Christmas

- Monarch Earthworks has approached the Town about creating a "Winter Village" of sorts with lights for people to enjoy over the holiday season. Discussions have started with events, facilities and operations and plans are for light up to be in conjunction with Community Christmas. Specific details and location(s) still to be finalized.

Communications:

- Work is still in progress for signage for the RV Park and amenities surrounding the Community Hub
- Work is still in progress for getting trail maps added to website once the updated town map project is completed
- Election information campaign now underway, posts will increase on social media as election time frame shortens, info in Reporter and Utility Bill inserts until election.
- Highway sign modem has been sent away for repairs, sign is running but cannot be updated until modem is repaired.

Family & Community Support Services

Penhold Family & Community Support Services (FCSS) offers a variety of programs, and information/referrals for all ages.

Program Highlights:

Chartered Professional Accountants (CPA) Alberta Tax Clinic: Community Partner

This new-to-Penhold program, was offered as a free virtual tax clinic and 13 eligible individuals participated in the program. The tax documents were uploaded to an online portal and certified accountants from CPA completed the returns.

Craft & Connect

This program continues to provide a welcoming and creative space for adults, creating opportunities for social connection. The participants often attend with friends, family and neighbours. June's Succulent Gardens was so popular, the registration was increased to 24 participants.



Community Events

Easter Eggstravaganza Saturday April 12

There were over 350 people who attended the event and enjoyed cookie colouring, crafts, face painting, bouncy houses, wagon rides through the RV Park, and Easter Bunny photos.

Canada Day Celebration Tuesday July 1

The PYC Pancake Breakfast raised approximately \$1500 for the PYC program.

Approximately 300 attendees, no admission fee.

The largest crowd in years enjoyed the activities; face painting, bubble show, crafts, caricature artist, and yard games at Lincoln Street Rec.



Penhold Youth Club (PYC)

A total of six field trips were organized this spring, with 88 youth participating in the activities. The trips included visits to Heritage Park, Escape Rooms, Galaxy Cineplex, West Edmonton Mall Waterpark, West Edmonton Mall Galaxyland, and Boardwalk Entertainment. PYC is incredibly grateful for the generous community support that made these experiences possible.

In February, Molly Simpson provided a presentation to 24 youth in grades 7-12 who were actively engaged in the discussion, asking thoughtful questions, and enjoying the opportunity to connect with an Olympian. Molly shared her journey, experiences, and stories from her career, inspiring the youth.

Speed Change: The school zone extension on Waskasoo Avenue has been implemented by operations and is being enforced during school zone times.

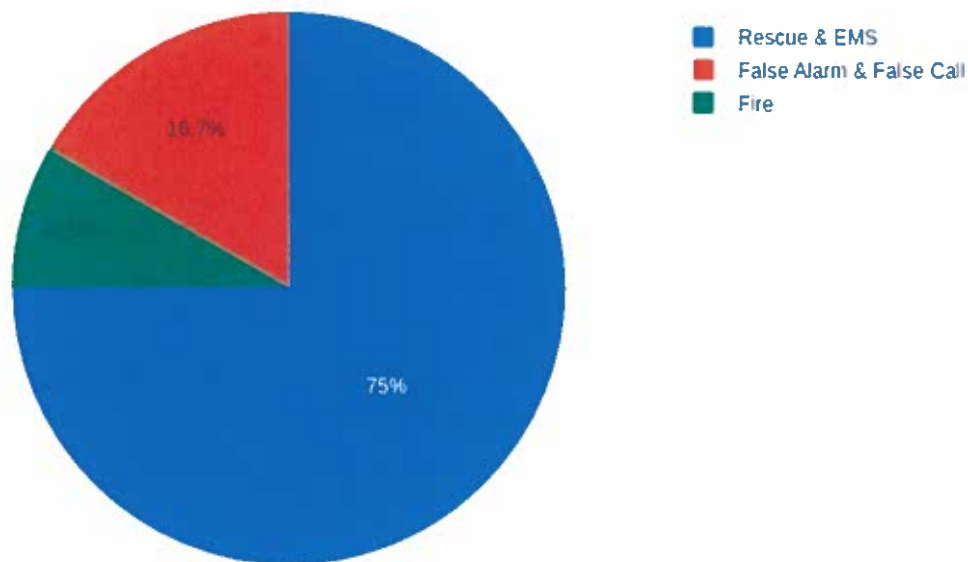
MONTHLY UPDATE:

Fire Department

Operations:

The department consists of 29 qualified members which includes 6 Probationary Firefighters, 13 Firefighters ranging from 4th to 1st class, 5 Lieutenants, 2 Captains, 2 Deputy Chiefs, and one Chief.

August 2025 Fire Department Calls



In August 2025, the Fire Department responded to a total of 12 calls:

- Rescue & EMS: 9 calls (75%)
- False Alarm & False Call: 2 calls (16.7%)
- Fire: 1 call (8.33%) - Electrical

Compared to July (14 calls):

- Rescue & EMS: no change
- False Alarms: decreased by 1
- Fire-related: no change
- Service related: decreased by 1

Training:

Standard First Aid was held in July.

NFPA 1403 Standard for Live Fire Training Evolutions is ongoing

Notes:

Penhold received a Training and Equipment grant for medical first response for \$3,200.00 for new medical kits.

We received a grant from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation of Canada for \$53,991.00 for bunker gear. The gear had multiple price increases from the time of grant submission to the time of reward. Thankfully, our vendor and supplier Associated Fire Safety Group and Starfield Lion, agreed to absorb the price increases themselves. The gear will not be

in our possession for weeks or months, once we have received the gear itself, we will take pictures and disseminate the information to the media. Approximately 12 weeks until delivery (16-week lead time originally). Ongoing

Ladder 1:

- During the CVIP Ladder 1 had:
 - o A transmission leak repaired
 - o A power steering hose replaced
 - o A hydraulic PTO leak repaired
- During operations the firefighters found an issue with the shifting fork that shifts the truck from road to pump. This fork was replaced last year. It was brought in for assessment and determined that the fork was misaligned and would be repaired under warranty.

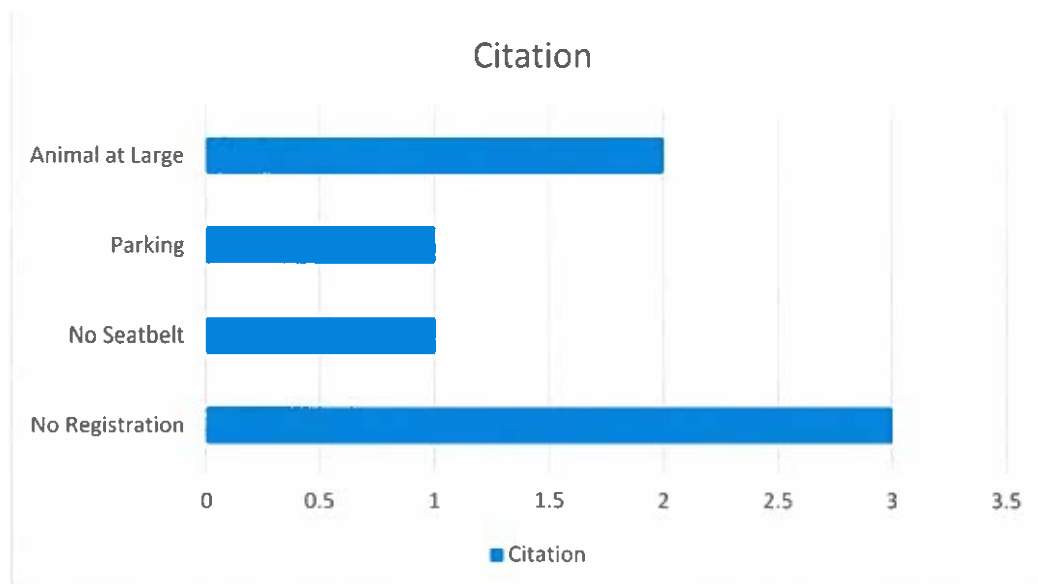

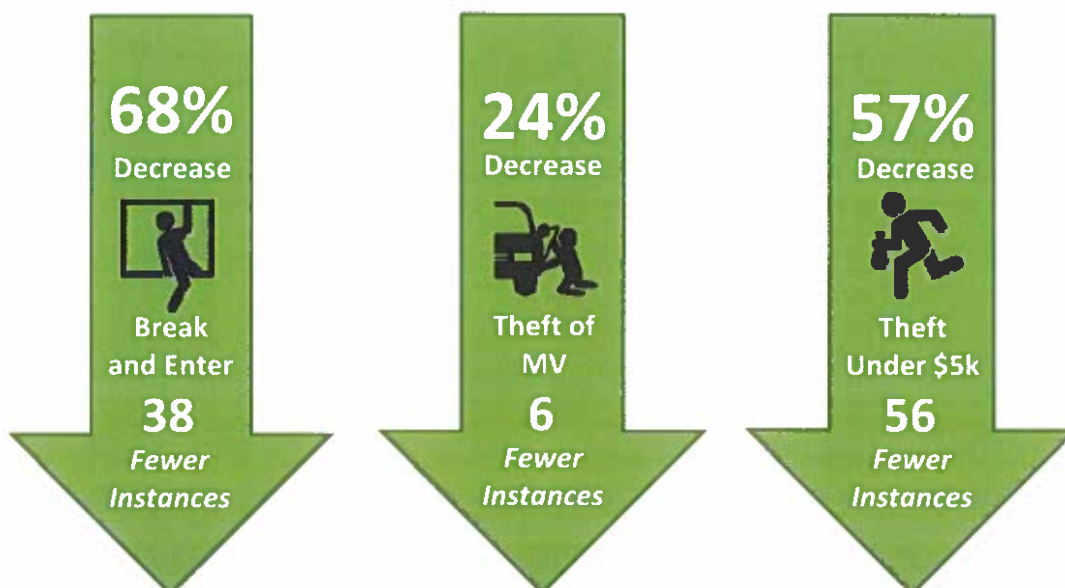

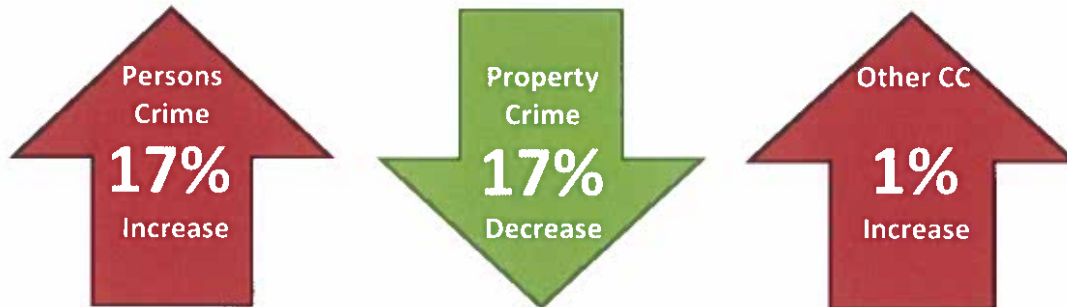

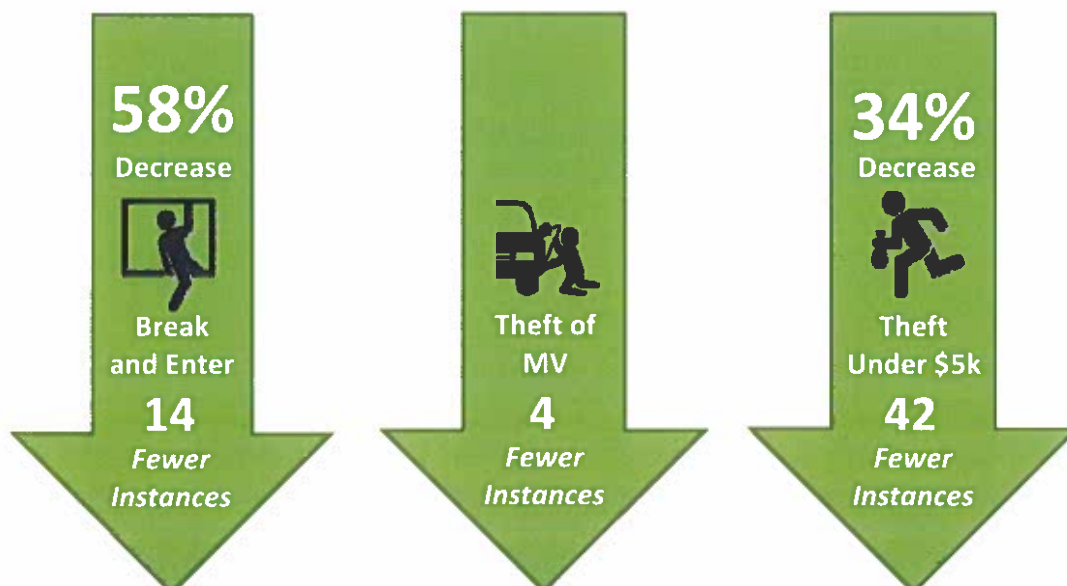
